Thank you for the letter following on the tentative arrangements we arrived at over the telephone.

About the trains. They don't seem to be very cooperative. There is one that leaves here at 4.56, Eastern

restaurant. On the whole I think it better if you make
the choice - can you drop me a card?

I have had a reply from Brown, which I shall bring along with me, together with any other correspondence received by the 4th.
